I then consulted with the supervising physician and a social worker to explore options such as prescription assistance programs, generic alternatives, and community resources that could help alleviate the financial burden. I also discussed the importance of the medication with the patient in a way that addressed their specific worries.
 4. **Result:** Through this collaborative approach, we were able to identify a suitable prescription assistance program, and

the patient agreed to begin their medication. This experience taught me the importance of addressing social determinants of health and advocating for patients beyond their immediate medical needs.

Other common behavioral questions revolve around teamwork, leadership, failure, conflict resolution, and dealing with stress.

Ethical Scenarios and Dilemmas

MMI interviews, in particular, often present ethical scenarios. The key is not necessarily to have the "perfect" answer but to demonstrate a thoughtful and ethical thought process. Consider:

1. **Identify stakeholders:** Who is affected by this decision?
2. **Ethical principles:** What core principles are at play (autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence, justice)?
3. **Pros and cons:** Weigh the different options and their potential outcomes.
4. **Communication:** How would you communicate your decision or approach to those involved?
5. **Your role:** What is your responsibility in this situation?

For example, a scenario might involve patient confidentiality, resource allocation, or end-of-life care. Articulate your reasoning clearly and logically, showing you can balance competing values.

Personal Questions: Motivations,

Experiences, and Goals

These questions delve into your personal journey and aspirations:

1. "Why our medical school?" (Crucial to research specific programs, faculty interests, and research opportunities.)
2. "What are your greatest strengths and weaknesses?"
3. "Describe a time you demonstrated leadership/teamwork/resilience."
4. "What do you do in your free time?" (Use this to showcase well-roundedness and interests outside of academics.)
5. "Where do you see yourself in 10 years?" (Connect this to your long-term career goals in medicine.)
6. "What are the biggest challenges facing healthcare today?" (Demonstrates awareness of the broader medical landscape.)

Mastering the Delivery: Non-Verbal Communication and Professionalism

Your words are important, but how you present yourself speaks volumes. Non-verbal cues play a significant role in making a positive impression.

Body Language and Eye Contact

Sit up straight, lean slightly forward to show engagement, and maintain consistent but comfortable eye contact with your interviewer(s). Avoid fidgeting, crossing your arms, or looking

down excessively. A genuine smile can go a long way in establishing rapport.

Active Listening

Pay close attention to the interviewer's questions. Nod occasionally and use verbal cues like "I see" or "That's an interesting point" to show you are engaged. If you're unsure about a question, it's better to ask for clarification than to provide an irrelevant answer.

Professional Attire

Dress professionally. For men, this typically means a suit, dress shirt, and tie. For women, a suit or a professional dress with a blazer is appropriate. Ensure your attire is clean, well-fitting, and conservative. Grooming should also be neat and tidy.

Enthusiasm and Passion

Let your genuine passion for medicine shine through. Your energy, sincerity, and desire to learn are infectious. Convey your excitement for the opportunity to train at their institution and contribute to the field.

The Art of Asking Questions:

Demonstrating Engagement and Insight

At the end of the interview, you'll typically be asked if you have any questions for the interviewer. This is not a formality; it's a crucial opportunity to demonstrate your interest and that you've done your homework.

1. **Avoid questions easily found online:** Don't ask about the school's ranking or the number of students in a class if that information is readily available on their website.
2. **Ask thoughtful, specific questions:**
 1. "What research opportunities are particularly strong for first-year medical students interested in [specific field]?"
 2. "How does the school support students who are exploring different specialties?"
 3. "Could you describe the mentorship program for medical students at this institution?"
 4. "What is the culture like among the students and faculty here?"
3. **Show you've listened:** If an interviewer mentioned a particular program or initiative during the interview, a question that connects to it shows you were actively listening.

Practice, Practice, Practice: Mock

Interviews are Key

Reading about interview tips is essential, but putting them into practice is where true mastery lies. Mock interviews are invaluable for several reasons:

1. **Familiarity with the format:** Experience the pressure of timed responses and different question types.
2. **Feedback on content:** Receive constructive criticism on your answers, ensuring they are clear, concise, and impactful.
3. **Identification of weak spots:** Discover areas where you struggle and need more preparation.
4. **Confidence building:** The more you practice, the more comfortable and confident you will feel on the actual interview day.

Conduct mock interviews with career advisors, mentors, current medical students, or even practice with friends and family. Ask them to provide honest feedback on both your answers and your delivery.

Post-Interview Etiquette: The Thank You Note

While not always explicitly stated, sending a thank you note after your interview is a professional courtesy and a chance to reiterate your interest.

1. **Timeliness:** Send your thank you note within 24-48 hours of

your interview.

2. **Personalization:** Refer to something specific you discussed with the interviewer to make it memorable.
3. **Reiterate interest:** Briefly mention your continued enthusiasm for the medical school.
4. **Conciseness:** Keep it brief and professional.
5. **Format:** Email is generally acceptable, but handwritten notes can also be appreciated if appropriate for the institution's culture.

The medical school interview is your chance to go beyond your GPA and MCAT scores and demonstrate the qualities that make you a future physician.
