For an advertisement disguised as a story: "Do you think the author wants you to buy something? How do you know?" "What is the purpose of this article about different animals?"

Strategies for Engaging with CML Questions in Grades 2-3

Both educators and parents can implement effective strategies to help students develop their skills in answering CML questions. The key is to make the process interactive and supportive.

For Educators:

1. **Model Think-Alouds:** When reading a text, verbalize your thought process when answering questions. "Hmm, the character looks sad, and their shoulders are slumped. I infer they are feeling upset about something."
2. **Use Graphic Organizers:** Tools like story maps, Venn diagrams, and KWL charts (Know, Want to know, Learned) visually support comprehension and help students organize their thoughts before answering questions.
3. **Differentiated Instruction:** Recognize that students will be at different levels. Provide more scaffolding and simpler questions for struggling readers, while offering extension activities and more complex questions for advanced learners.
4. **Incorporate Various Text Types:** Expose students to a wide range of genres, including fiction, non-fiction, poetry, and even simple digital texts, to build diverse comprehension skills.
5. **Teach Questioning Strategies:** Explicitly teach students how to identify the type of question being asked and what kind of answer is expected.
6. **Focus on Evidence-Based Answers:** Emphasize the importance of finding "text evidence" to support their answers, especially for inferential and main idea questions.

For Parents:

1. **Read Aloud Regularly:** Continue reading aloud to your child, even after they can read independently. This exposes them to more complex vocabulary and sentence structures and provides opportunities for discussion.
2. **Ask Open-Ended Questions:** Don't just ask "Did you like the story?" Instead, ask "What was your favorite part and why?" or "How do you think the character felt when...?"
3. **Connect to Real-Life Experiences:** Help your child make connections between what they read and their own lives. "Remember when we went to the park? This character is also enjoying nature."
4. **Review Schoolwork:** Look at your child's reading assignments and questions. Ask them to explain their answers and, if they struggle, help them revisit the text.
5. **Encourage Re-reading:** Sometimes, re-reading a passage can unlock understanding. Encourage your child to go back and read sections that confused them.
6. **Build Vocabulary at Home:** Use new and interesting words in conversation, explain their meanings, and encourage your child to do the same.
