1. **Straight Needles:** Suitable for smaller blankets or if you prefer knitting flat. However, for larger blankets, the weight can become cumbersome.
2. **Circular Needles:** These are highly recommended for knitting blankets. The stitches are held on a flexible cable between two needle tips, allowing the weight of the project to be distributed evenly. This makes knitting much more comfortable, especially for large items. Choose a cable length that accommodates the width of your blanket.

Needle material (wood, bamboo, metal) is largely a matter of personal

preference. Wood and bamboo offer more grip, which can be helpful for slippery yarns, while metal needles are often faster.

Other Essential Notions

1. **Scissors:** A sharp pair for cutting yarn.
2. **Tapestry Needle:** A blunt-tipped needle with a large eye for weaving in yarn ends and seaming.

Weaving in Ends

Blocking Your Blanket

Blocking is the process of shaping your knitted fabric by wetting it (or steaming it) and allowing it to dry in the desired dimensions. This evens out stitches, opens up lace patterns, and gives your blanket a professional finish. Different yarn fibers require different blocking methods:

1. **Wool:** Often benefited from wet blocking. Soak the blanket, gently squeeze out excess water, lay it flat on blocking mats or towels, and pin it to the desired dimensions.
