By thoughtfully crafting and strategically deploying behavioral, situational, technical, motivational, and cultural fit questions, organizations can gain a deeper understanding of their candidates, identify true potential, and ultimately make more informed hiring decisions. The investment in asking good questions is an investment in building a stronger, more effective, and more successful team.
