Diaphragmatic Breathing: Your Vocal Powerhouse

The most effective breathing technique for singing is diaphragmatic breathing, often referred to as abdominal or belly breathing. Instead of shallow chest breaths, which limit airflow and create tension, diaphragmatic breathing engages your diaphragm, a large muscle located at the base of your lungs. Optimal Posture for Singing
