The air-fuel ratio is critical for efficient combustion; too little fuel results in a weak mixture, while too much can lead to incomplete burning and wasted energy. Modern engines use sophisticated computer systems to precisely control this mixture.

Stroke 2: Compression

With the intake valve now closed, the piston begins to move upwards, compressing the air-fuel mixture into a much smaller space at the top of the cylinder. This compression is vital because it increases the temperature and pressure of the mixture, making it more volatile and ready for ignition. The degree of compression, known as the compression ratio, directly impacts engine performance and efficiency.

Stroke 3: Power (Combustion)

This is the "bang" that generates power. When the piston reaches the top of its stroke and the fuel-air mixture is maximally compressed, the spark plug fires. This electrical spark ignites the highly compressed mixture, causing a rapid and powerful explosion (combustion). The immense pressure generated by this explosion forces the piston downwards with great force. This downward thrust is what drives the crankshaft, ultimately providing the rotational force to move the car.

Stroke 4: Exhaust

Once the piston has completed its power stroke and reached the bottom, the exhaust valve opens. The piston then moves upwards again, pushing the spent combustion gases (exhaust fumes) out of the cylinder and into the exhaust system. This clears the cylinder, preparing it for the next intake stroke and the continuation of the cycle.

This four-stroke sequence repeats thousands of times per minute, with each cylinder firing in a precisely timed order to ensure smooth and continuous power delivery. The synchronized movement of all these components, orchestrated by the engine's timing system (including the camshaft and timing belt/chain), is what makes a car run.

Beyond the Basics: Supporting Systems for Engine Operation

While the four-stroke cycle is the engine's core function, several other vital systems work in harmony to keep it running efficiently and reliably:

1. Fuel System: Delivering the Lifeblood

The fuel system's role is to deliver the correct amount of fuel to the cylinders. In modern vehicles, this is primarily achieved through **fuel injection**. Fuel injectors are electronically controlled nozzles that spray atomized fuel directly into the intake manifold or combustion chamber. This precise delivery, managed by the Engine Control Unit (ECU), optimizes fuel economy and reduces emissions. Older vehicles used carburetors, which mechanically mixed air and fuel but were less precise.

2. Ignition System: The Spark of Life

The ignition system provides the electrical spark needed to ignite the fuel-air mixture. It comprises the spark plugs, ignition coils (which amplify voltage), and the ECU. The ECU determines when each spark plug should fire, ensuring optimal timing for maximum power and efficiency. A faulty spark plug or ignition coil can lead to misfires, reduced performance, and increased fuel consumption.

3. Lubrication System: Reducing Friction and Heat

The engine's moving parts generate a tremendous amount of friction and heat. The lubrication system, centered around the **engine oil**, is essential for managing these forces. The oil pump circulates oil throughout the engine, lubricating critical components like the crankshaft, connecting rods, camshaft, and piston rings. This reduces wear and tear, prevents seizing, and helps dissipate heat. Regular oil changes are paramount to engine longevity.

4. Cooling System: Preventing Overheating

The combustion process generates extreme heat. The cooling system prevents the engine from overheating. It typically consists of a radiator, water pump, thermostat, and coolant (a mixture of antifreeze and water). Coolant circulates through passages in the engine block and cylinder head, absorbing heat. This hot coolant then flows to the radiator, where it is cooled by airflow before

being recirculated. The thermostat regulates coolant flow to maintain an optimal operating temperature.

5. Exhaust System: Clearing the Way

The exhaust system's primary function is to safely remove burnt gases from the engine and reduce noise. It includes exhaust manifolds, catalytic converters (which reduce harmful emissions), mufflers (to quiet the sound), and tailpipes. The flow of exhaust gases also plays a role in engine performance.

The Role of the ECU (Engine Control Unit)

In modern vehicles, the Engine Control Unit (ECU), often referred to as the car's computer, is the brain of the operation. It receives data from numerous sensors throughout the engine – such as oxygen sensors, mass airflow sensors, throttle position sensors, and knock sensors – and uses this information to precisely control fuel injection, ignition timing, valve timing, and other engine parameters. This sophisticated control allows for optimal performance, fuel efficiency, and emissions control.
