You can delete existing partitions (which will erase their data) and create new ones, or format an existing partition. **Ensure you are selecting the correct partition to avoid data loss on other drives.**
3. After selecting the partition where you want to install Windows 7, click '**Next**'.

The installer will then format the chosen partition and begin copying Windows files.

6. Installation Process: Copying Files and Installing Features

Windows 7 will now begin copying files to your hard drive, installing features, and applying updates. This process can take anywhere from 15 minutes to over an hour, depending on your hardware speed.

Your computer will restart multiple times during this phase. **Do NOT press any key to boot from the installation media when prompted after the first restart.** Allow the computer to boot from the hard drive to continue the installation. If you accidentally boot from the media again, simply restart the computer and let it boot from the hard drive.
