The Bionic Ear Today: Beyond Invention

Today, the bionic ear is a highly sophisticated piece of medical technology. It consists of external components (a microphone, speech processor, and transmitter) and an internal implanted device (receiver/stimulator and electrode array). The microphone captures sound, the speech processor converts it into digital signals, and the transmitter sends these signals to the internal device. The internal device then stimulates the auditory nerve via the electrode array, which the brain

interprets as sound.
