1. **Insert Toothpicks:** Carefully insert three or four toothpicks, evenly spaced, into the sides of the pit. These will act as supports.
2. **Suspend in Water:** Place the pit, bottom-end down, into a glass or jar filled with water. The toothpicks should rest on the rim of the glass, suspending the pit so that the bottom half is submerged in water.
3. **Find the Right Spot:** Place the glass in a warm location that receives indirect sunlight. Avoid direct sunlight, which can overheat the water and damage the seed.
4. **Regular Water Changes:** Change the water every few days, or whenever it starts to look cloudy. This prevents bacterial growth and ensures a fresh environment for germination.

Patience is key here. It can take anywhere from 2 to 8 weeks for the pit to sprout. You'll eventually see the outer skin of the pit crack, followed by the emergence of a root from the bottom and a sprout from the top.

Alternative: Soil Germination
