2. **Polycythemia:** A condition of an abnormally high number of RBCs, which can increase blood viscosity and the risk of blood clots. This can be caused by dehydration, lung disease, or certain cancers.

Hematocrit (Hct): This measures the percentage of blood volume occupied by red blood cells. It often parallels hemoglobin levels but can be affected by hydration status.

Mean Corpuscular Volume (MCV): This indicates the average size of red blood cells. It helps differentiate types of anemia, such as microcytic anemia (small RBCs, often iron deficiency) and macrocytic anemia (large RBCs, often B12 or folate deficiency).

Mean Corpuscular Hemoglobin Concentration (MCHC): This reflects the average concentration of hemoglobin

within red blood cells, aiding in the classification of anemia.

White Blood Cells (WBCs)

White blood cells, or leukocytes, are the body's defense against infection and disease. The total WBC count and the differential (percentages of different types of WBCs) provide crucial information about the immune system.

1. **Leukocytosis:** An elevated WBC count, often indicative of infection (bacterial or viral), inflammation, or stress.
2. **Leukopenia:** A decreased WBC count, which can make the patient more susceptible to infections and may be caused by certain medications, autoimmune diseases, or bone marrow disorders.

WBC Differential: Understanding Neutrophils, Lymphocytes, Monocytes, Eosinophils, and Basophils

The WBC differential breaks down the types of white blood cells present:

1. **Neutrophils:** The most abundant WBCs, primarily fighting bacterial infections. An increase in neutrophils (neutrophilia) is common with bacterial infections. A decrease (neutropenia) increases infection risk.
2. **Lymphocytes:** Crucial for viral infections and immune memory. An increase in lymphocytes (lymphocytosis) can indicate viral infections or chronic lymphocytic leukemia. A decrease can occur with certain infections or immunosuppression.
3. **Monocytes:** Involved in fighting chronic infections and cleaning up cellular debris. Monocytosis can be seen in chronic infections or inflammatory conditions.

5. **Basophils:** Least common WBCs, involved in inflammatory and allergic responses.

Platelets (Thrombocytes)

1. **Thrombocytopenia:** A low platelet count, increasing the risk of bleeding. This can be caused by certain medications, infections, or autoimmune disorders.
2. **Thrombocytosis:** A high platelet count, which can increase the risk of blood clots.

Metabolic Panel Essentials: Assessing Organ Function

The metabolic panel, often divided into basic (BMP) and comprehensive (CMP), evaluates the balance of electrolytes, fluids, and key metabolites in the blood, providing insights into kidney, liver, and metabolic function.

Electrolytes: Sodium (Na), Potassium (K), Chloride (Cl), and Bicarbonate (HCO₃)

Electrolytes are minerals that carry an electric charge and are vital for nerve and muscle function, hydration, and acid-base balance.

1. **Sodium:** Crucial for fluid balance and nerve impulses. Hyponatremia (low sodium) can cause confusion, seizures, and lethargy. Hypernatremia (high sodium) can lead to dehydration and neurological symptoms.

3. **Chloride:** Works with sodium to maintain fluid balance and acid-base homeostasis. Abnormalities often mirror sodium imbalances.
4. **Bicarbonate (or CO₂):** Reflects the body's acid-base balance. Abnormal levels can indicate metabolic acidosis or alkalosis.

Kidney Function Tests: Blood Urea Nitrogen (BUN) and Creatinine

These tests are primary indicators of kidney health.

1. **Blood Urea Nitrogen (BUN):** Urea is a waste product of protein metabolism. Elevated BUN levels can indicate impaired kidney function, dehydration, or increased protein breakdown.
2. **Creatinine:** A waste product of muscle metabolism. Creatinine is excreted by the kidneys, so elevated levels usually signify decreased kidney function. It's often considered a more specific indicator of kidney health than BUN.

Estimated Glomerular Filtration Rate (eGFR): This calculation, often reported alongside creatinine, estimates how well the kidneys are filtering waste products from the blood.

Liver Function Tests (LFTs)

LFTs assess the health and function of the liver.

1. **Alanine Aminotransferase (ALT) and Aspartate Aminotransferase (AST):** Enzymes primarily found in the liver. Elevated levels can indicate liver damage from hepatitis, alcohol, or other toxins.
2. **Alkaline Phosphatase (ALP):** Found in the liver, bones, and other tissues. Elevated ALP can suggest liver disease, bone disorders, or bile duct obstruction.
3. **Bilirubin:** A waste product from the breakdown of red blood cells. Elevated bilirubin (jaundice) can indicate liver dysfunction or increased red blood cell breakdown.

Glucose

Blood glucose levels are critical for assessing carbohydrate metabolism and diagnosing or monitoring diabetes.

1. **Fasting Blood Glucose:** Measured after an overnight fast. High levels can indicate prediabetes or diabetes.
2. **Hemoglobin A1c (HbA1c):** Provides an average blood glucose level over the past 2-3 months, offering a long-term view of glycemic control.

Coagulation Studies: Assessing the Clotting Cascade

Coagulation studies are vital for evaluating the blood's ability to clot, crucial for preventing excessive bleeding or the formation of dangerous clots.

Prothrombin Time (PT) and International Normalized Ratio (INR)

These tests assess the extrinsic pathway of the coagulation cascade. They are particularly important for patients on anticoagulant medications like warfarin.
